Water Resources

- Middle Loup River is **not** a 303d water body
 - o Impaired for recreation use, caused by pathogens
- Munson Creek is a 303d water body
 - o Impaired for aquatic life, cause unknown
- North Loup River is a 303d water body
 - o Impaired for recreation use, caused by pathogens
- North Loup Lake (SRA) is a 303d water body
 - o Impaired for aquatic life, caused by mercury
- The DPA has one Wellhead Protection Areas
 - o City of St. Paul (NE3109306)

 - o Leonard A. Koziol WMA
 - o North Loup SRA
 - o Marsh Wren WMA
