 - o Impaired for recreation use, caused by pathogens
 - o Impaired for aesthetics, caused by sediment
- Olive Branch is a 303d water body
 - o Impaired for aquatic life, cause unknown
- Merganser Lake (25A) is a 303d water body
 - o Impaired for aquatic life, caused by mercury
- Wild Plum Lake (26A) is a 303d water body
 - Impaired for aquatic life, caused by mercury
- Olive Creek Lake is a 303d water body
 - Impaired for aquatic life, caused by algal growth, mercury, nutrients, oxygen depletion, pH acidity caustic conditions
- The DPA has three Wellhead Protection Areas
 - City of Crete (NE3115104)
 - Village of Sprague (NE3110904)
 - Village of Denton (NE3110913)
